


- · At first, only rich people could afford to go to the seaside.
- The invention of the **steam train** and the building of the railways meant that travelling to the seaside became quicker and cheaper.
- Victorians used bathing machines to get changed in and step straight into the sea from.
- There are differences, but also many similarities, between Victorian seaside holidays and seaside holidays today.

The Victorian era is **beyond living memory**. It began in 1837, when Queen Victoria came to the throne, and ended in 1901, when she died.
